
Observer data

- New Zealand fisheries monitored by Government observers
- Observers record seabird bycatch
- In the 2009 fishing year, there were 586 seabird captures reported by fisheries observers from fisheries operating within New Zealand waters

Estimating seabird bycatch



Estimation has a narrow question

How many captures would have been reported, had all fishing been observed?

Limitations


- Only sufficiently observed fisheries
- Only for individual species with high observed captures
- No cryptic mortality
- Not related to demographic status
- · No consideration of other impacts

A synthesis requires a risk assessment approach






Observed white capped albatross bycatch in squid trawl fisheries, 2009; 53 observed captures



White-capped albatross


- Captures of 776 (624–968) in 2005
- Fell to 156 (118–205) in 2009




Capture rate of white-capped albatross in the Auckland Islands squid fishery

Reduced capture rate

- · Sandy Bartle recorded 27.9 captures per 100 tows in 1991
- Mean capture rate of 9.4 from 2003 to 2005
- Mean capture rate of 4.1 from 2006 to 2009





Capture rate of white-capped albatross in the Auckland Islands squid fishery







White chinned petrel, 1999 to 2009




Estimated captures of white chinned petrel

All EEZ, large vessel demersal longline fisheries

High uncertainty


- Estimated captures of 1025 (595–2179) in 2002
- Fell to 371 (36–1366) in 2009
- Mean estimate of integrated weight line effect of 12.8%
- Observations biased to vessels that use integrated weight line



Captures of white chinned petrel in demersal longline


Estimated seabird bycatch

Estimated bycatch in commercial fisheries

Currently around 4 000 captures annually



Offshore trawl, pelagic longline, large vessel and snapper demersal longline

Recreational fisheries

Over 10 000 captures annually

- Carried out 763 boat ramp interviews; 21 people reported a seabird capture on the day of the interview
- In the Hauraki Gulf, there are 4 million hours of fishing annually
- Translates into 11 500 (95% c.i.: 6 600 to 17 200) seabird captures
- A thumb-suck of 40 000 captures nationally, from telephone survey estimates of the amount of fishing
- Post-capture survival unknown
